NOTICE TO CONTRIBUTORS

The Journal welcomes previously unpublished papers which contribute to the advancement of knowledge of tropical medicine and hygiene.

Manuscripts should be sent to the Editor, Dr. Paul C. Beaver, Tulane Medical Center, 1430 Tulane Avenue, New Orleans, La. 70112, U.S.A. Queries concerning reprints should be addressed to Allen Press, Inc., 1041 New Hampshire Street, Lawrence, Kansas 66044.

Papers not exceeding two printed pages will be published as "Brief Communications" in the next available issue.

Publication will be facilitated if the following suggestions are followed:

1. *Manuscripts* should be typewritten in English on one side of the paper and submitted in duplicate. The preferred size of sheet is $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches. *Double spacing* should be used throughout the manuscript including the list of references, tables, footnotes, and quotations. Tabular or other material that has been reduced by Xeroxing is not acceptable.

2. The following should be supplied, *typed each on a separate sheet*: (a) a short title of not more than 50 letters for use as a running head; (b) the full title; (c) authors' names and affiliations; (d) footnotes; (e) address to which proofs are to be sent; (f) a concise, informative abstract; (g) list of the references cited; and (h) legends for the illustrations.

3. *Tables* should be typed each on a separate sheet and numbered serially in Arabic numerals. They should be designed for printing in 1-column width if possible, and should never require more than full-page width.

4. *Illustrations*. Graphs, drawings, and photographs selected to illustrate specific points should be numbered and each should be cited in the text. Only glossy photographic prints or drawings in black India ink on white drawing paper or tracing linen can be used. Plates should be planned for a maximum page size of $5\frac{1}{2} \times 8$ inches, including space for the legend to be placed below the figures. One of the two sets of the illustrations should be unmounted. Text figures should be suitable for reduction without loss of legibility to a 1-column width of $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches, or with good balance and legibility when printed at page-width of $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Color illustrations can be reproduced only at the expense of the author. Material for illustrations should be protected with cardboard; the back of each should bear the figure number, name of senior author, and an arrow indicating the top of the figure.

5. *Legends* should be separate and not attached to, or written on, the illustration copy.

6. *References* should be cited by consecutive numbers in the text, and so numbered and listed in the list of references at the end of the article, without regard to alphabetical arrangement. Abbreviations for titles of journals should follow those used in BIOSIS, published by Biosciences Information of Biological Abstracts, 2100 Arch Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19103. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of their references. When it is essential to cite personal communications and unpublished reports, these should be so designated in parentheses in the text, along with the full name and address of persons other than the authors themselves.

7. *Proprietary names of drugs or chemicals* may be used in conjunction with the generic name when the substance is first mentioned in the abstract and in the body of the article. The generic name should be used elsewhere.

8. *Symbols and common abbreviations* should be used freely and should conform to the Style Manual for Biological Journals; others should be kept to a minimum and preferably be limited to the tables where they can be explained in footnotes. The inventing of abbreviations is not encouraged—if they are thought essential, their meaning should be spelled out at first mention.

Manuscripts are copy-edited for clarity, conciseness, and for conformity to Journal style.

Page charges. For the 1983 volume, the Society requests subvention of \$80 per page for pages in excess of four.

Cost of reprints. When the cost of reprints must be known in advance of publication, the Editor will be glad to furnish an estimate. A price list and an order blank will be sent to authors with proof.
